# Don't miss these museum highlights!

## Percy & Small Shipyard

### Mary E

Step aboard this 1906 Bath-built schooner to learn about its incredible history. Better yet, go for a sail on the Kennebec River!

### Wyoming sculpture

It's impossible to miss the sculpture of the schooner *Wyoming*, the largest wooden sailing vessel ever built in North America! *Wyoming* was built and launched from this site in 1909.

### Mill & Joiner Shop

One of the original Percy & Small Shipyard buildings, walk in the footsteps of the shipbuilders who once worked in this yard to see how timbers were cut and finished.

### Boatshop

Stop by the Boatshop to see craftsmen at work building and restoring wooden boats using traditional tools and techniques.

### Donnell House

Visit the Victorian home of the Donnell Family and see how one of Bath's famed shipbuilding families lived in 1896.

### Lobstering & the Maine Coast

Explore this 6,200-square-foot, multilevel exhibit for the complete story of Maine's most iconic fishery: from trap to table.

## Maritime History Building

### Into the Lantern

Experience the sensation of standing high atop a lighthouse tower in this immersive exhibit, which features a second-order Fresnel lens and video projections of the Gulf of Maine.

### Report Me All Well

This Charles Robert Patterson painting originally hung in the dining room of a passenger ocean liner. The signal flags flying on the *W.R. Grace* read "BQD" which means "report me all well."

## South Campus

### BIW: Building America's Navy

Produced in collaboration with Bath Iron Works, this exhibit provides an immersive, high-tech look at the people, processes, and ships of BIW.

### Skip and Gerry Orem Kennebec Riverwalk

Visit the Riverwalk to learn more about the unique ecology of the Kennebec Estuary and Merrymeeting Bay while enjoying beautiful views of the river and Doubling Point Light.

### Snow Squall: An American Clipper Ship

Abandoned in the Falkland Islands in 1864, a portion of the 1851 *Snow Squall's* bow was recovered in the 1980s – the only remains of an American clipper ship in existence.
